

The new Management Board of Polskie LNG

The Supervisory Board of Polskie LNG has appointed the new Management Board. Since August 1, 2017 Marek Drac-Tato will hold the position of the President of the Management Board, whilst Bartłomiej Słoma will be the Vice-President.

Marek Drac-Tato has Ph.D. in economy from the University of Szczecin and holds a chartered auditor's certificate. He took the position of CEO in Management Boards of Nafta Polska and Polska Korporacja Inwestycyjna. He was involved in operations of Supervisory Boards of Zakłady Azotowe Tarnów and Zakłady Chemiczne Wiskord, acting as a Chairman, as well as of PKN Orlen, Zakłady Chemiczne Police. He gained his expertise in Ernst & Young, a consulting company, and Polskie Towarzystwo Ubezpieczeń. He was in charge of financial advisory and audit of financial statements in the Chartered Auditor's Office.

Bartłomiej Słoma is a legal advisor, a graduate of Faculty of Law & Administration, University of Warsaw. He was a Member of Supervisory Boards in the companies operating in the power industry, incl. Poszukiwania Nafty i Gazu Kraków Sp. z o.o. and Siarkopol Gdańsk S.A., where he also acted as a CEO. In 2006 – 2007 he worked in Department of Diversification of Power Carrier Deliveries, Ministry of Economy. He has been Deputy Director of the Legal and Organizational Division, GAZ-SYSTEM.

Gas Transmission Operator GAZ-SYSTEM S.A. is a strategic company for Poland's economy, responsible for transmission of natural gas and management of key gas pipelines across Poland. In addition, GAZ-SYSTEM S.A. is an owner of Polskie LNG S.A., that was set up to build and operate the President Lech Kaczyński LNG Terminal, based in Winoujcie.

GAZ-SYSTEM is a strategic company for the Polish economy. It is responsible for the transmission of natural gas, manages the most important gas pipelines in Poland and owns the President Lech Kaczyński LNG Terminal in Winoujcie.

As part of the 2015-2025 investment programme, GAZ-SYSTEM is constructing over 2000 km of new gas pipelines in the western, southern and eastern parts of Poland. Over a dozen new gas pipelines are under construction within the North-South Gas Corridor and the compressor station in Kierżyn Kościelny, as well as interconnections with Lithuania and Slovakia. Onshore gas pipelines are planned to connect the planned FSRU floating terminal in the Gulf of Gdansk with the national transmission system. The LNG Terminal in Winoujcie is also being extended, as a result of which the regasification capacity of this facility will be increased by more than a half.

The company is also implementing one of the most important infrastructural projects in the country - the Baltic Pipe project which consists in the construction of a two-way offshore gas pipeline connecting Poland and Denmark, expansion of the local transmission network and three gas compressor stations.

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
